Motus Wildlife Tracking System: Determining landscape use of migratory animals in Eastern Canada.

The Motus Wildlife Tracking System is a joint project of Bird Studies Canada, Western University, Acadia University and the University of Guelph. The primary goal of the project is to establish a network of automated radio telemetry arrays throughout the Americas that will allow the real time tracking of radio tagged flying migratory animals throughout the land and seascape.

In 2014 The Sydenham Sportsmen's Association was asked to be part of this unique program by allowing for the placement of a radio telemetry tower on our property. This 24 ft tower now sits on the R. Blake Smith Conservation property that we like to call our wildlife demonstration field.

Some of the largest barriers to effective conservation and management of migratory animals is our ability to determine the importance of various landscapes and how they are utilized throughout their annual cycle.

Southern Ontario and Atlantic Canada have numerous geographic (e.g. the Great lakes, Niagra Escarpment, Bay of Fundy) and anthropogenic features (major urban centers, industrial, utility, and transportation infrastructure) that might influence migratory animals use of and movement throughout the landscape.

Getting a better understanding of these processes will help decision – makers and other stake holders make informed and ecologically sound decisions with regard to wildlife management, policy and regulation.

A major portion of their funding is directed at the development of automated telemetry arrays, which will allow researchers to track the movements of radio tagged birds, bats and insects throughout the land and seascape with unprecedented precision.

The tagging process varies depending on the species and the project. Motus acts as a organizing body, all the tags are put out by separate projects that tap into their network of receiver stations.

Many songbirds are captured using mistnets. The vertical nets are set up in wooded areas and as the birds fly by they get tangled and then you can remove them safely and attach a tag. In terms of timing for songbirds, you generally do it first thing in the morning when birds are most active, and you wouldn't do it in heavy rain or high winds so as not to hurt the birds.

Other species are captured in other ways, for example, some seabirds are captured while they are on their nests using a number of live trap methods. There are also some species that can be captured by shooting a net at them. You can capture seabirds this way from a small plane or helicopter. In these cases you would have a large group of people ready to remove the birds as quickly as possible to reduce stress and injury. Of course all of this capturing and tagging requires a number of permits and animal safety protocols.

Tags are put on using a leg-loop body harness, it's like a little backpack that rests on the bird's lower back, with elastic thread wrapping around the birds thighs. Each tag weighs less than 5% of the bird's body weight to reduce any impacts on the bird. The smallest tags only have a lifespan of 15 days, the largest ones nearly three years. From a recent update sent to us from the Motus group 12 birds representing eight different species were detected in our area in 2017 and 2018. This is a very small detection number considering that in 2017 they radio-tagged 111 species and 3626 individuals including birds, bats and insects. Motus points out that although we may have only a few detections, it is still providing valuable data as part of the whole array.

Conservation embodies a large spectrum of our environment. Big or small any conservation projects are worth our efforts and we have always tried to do our part.



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Parks Canada kills thousands of fish with Whirling Disease

Parks Canada has so far killed and removed up to 30,000 fish from Johnson Lake and its surrounding streams and wetlands as it continues to try and eradicate whirling disease from the 18-hectare lake.

It was the first time the disease was detected in Canada. In response, Parks implemented a three-year plan to remove all fish from the lake. Click on the following two sentences to access the full story.

The disease is not harmful to humans. "The biggest vector is humans moving live fish around watersheds," said Nelson-Chorney. On top of removing fish, Parks Canada has also closed all critical habitat for west slope cut-throat trout throughout the park, banned felt soled wading boots and implemented a catch and release policy for all fish, except for two lake trout from Lake Minnewanka. ²
