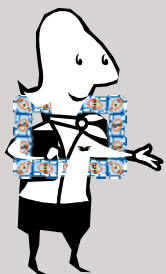

Reducing Neonicotinoid Pesticide Use by 80 Per Cent

Reducing Neonicotinoid Pesticide Use by 80 Per Cent

March 23, 2015

Ontario Setting New Rules to Protect Bees, Other Pollinators

Ontario is taking the strongest action in North America to protect bees, birds, butterflies, and other pollinators by proposing new rules that would reduce the number of acres planted with neonicotinoid-treated corn and soybean seeds by 80 per cent by 2017.

Some neonicotinoid insecticides are toxic to bees and other beneficial insects. The government is taking a precautionary approach to limit the use of neonicotinoid treated seeds. The proposed regulation sets rules for the sale and use of neonicotinoid-treated corn and soybean seeds.

The draft regulation is available for public comment on the environmental registry until May 7, 2015. If approved, new rules would take effect July 1, 2015.

Following provincewide consultations in winter 2014-15, the proposed regulation will help protect pollinators and ensure a productive agricultural sector. It is also an important step in developing a pollinator health action plan that will examine key stressors that can affect pollinator health, including:

- a.. Pesticides
- b.. Loss of habitat and nutrition
- c.. Climate change and weather
- d.. Disease, pests and genetics

Ensuring a strong and healthy agricultural sector is part of the government's economic plan for Ontario. The four part plan is building Ontario up by investing in people's talents and skills, building new public infrastructure like roads and transit, creating a dynamic, supportive environment where business thrives, and building a secure savings plan so everyone can afford to retire.

QUICK FACTS

- a.. In the winter of 2013-2014, bee deaths in Ontario reached 58 per cent. The generally accepted level by those who care for and breed bees is 15 per cent.
- b.. Bees and other pollinators are responsible for pollinating roughly 13 per cent of agricultural crops in Ontario (crops worth about \$897 million), and support \$26 million annually in honey production.
- c.. Ontario's agri-food sector employs 760,000 individuals and contributes \$34 billion each year to the province's economy.

RANGE REPORT - SHOOTING SPORTS

Well Spring has finally arrived, and things are getting busy on all the ranges. So let me give you a brief update on all that's happening by range during the early part of this year.

Range #1 - Handgun range: A work party has been planned to refurbish the backstop, take down the plastic windbreaks and do a general clean up. Then some work will begin to cover in a portion of the lower sections of the structure. A new more simplified Sign-in system will also be introduced.

Range #2 - Rimfire/CBA: Here as well there will be a general clean-up and refurbishing of the backstop and targets. This range is going to be quite busy this year with many Defense Pistol & Cowboy Action sessions planned. Don't forget to come see the action at "Cowboy Camp" on May 23/15. Check our Calendar on the SSA website for all the details.

Range #3 - 100 Yard Range: This range requires some extensive work on the backstops by filling in the cavities, plus refurbishing and replacing many of the sandbags. There is a plan to increase the height of the two bunkers by a couple of railway ties and this will hopefully be completed at the same time. Some minor changes are planned for behind the firing line to make it easier and safer. We also plan to open this range on more occasions with some morning and evening times for our members convenience. Here again please refer to our Calendar on the SSA website for details.

Range #4 - Single Trap Field: Based on the increased number of Trap shooters coming out to the ranges, this one will definitely be open more this year than last. Al is still working on putting up a overhead shelter down here and we should hear some more of the details a little later in the season. This range will just get a general clean-up sometime in May.

Range #5 - Field Sporting Clays: This is the last shotgun range to open each year because of the location in the bush and the snowy/marshy conditions.

We are starting the process of investigating how we can improve this range through changes in stations, additions of stations and changing locations of stations. This is going to take some time, since once we figure out what is the best layout, and how many teams can shoot on the course at once. We still have to get it approved by our Executive and then approved by the CFO's office. Not to mention how much it will cost and when we can start the work of making it happen. This process is already underway and we will keep everyone informed of our progress.

Range #6 - Single Skeet Field/Trap Field: Lots of new things happening or about to happen here again this year. Al has installed a new voice activated system on the Trap Field, he tested it for the first time on Sunday April 19th and it worked great. I know because I was there and tried it out, didn't help my score any, I still shot 20, but it was fantastic. We are going through so many birds lately because of the increased participation in the shotgun sports we need more space to store our supply so, we are also getting a new container to hold our Clay Birds and it will be installed next to the 100 Yd. range side berm.

Archery Practice Facility: Within the next month this area will get some new carpeting put on the older targets and a general clean-up of the area.

Archery Walk-through Range: This range was still too wet and soggy to work on when I walked through on April 20th, so we are planning a work Party the first part of May. Here we will be clearing the windfalls, trimming the lanes and refurbishing and/or replacing some of the butts. We can use all the help we can get here, so if your available to pitch in just give me a call at 519-372-0804 and we can set up the timing. Later in the season we will again be putting out 10 of the 3D targets for your usage, and I will be looking for some help and I will keep you informed on when and how.

Thanks goes out to one of our Members who has taken it upon himself to put up some new bow hangers on this range, your help is very much appreciated.
