

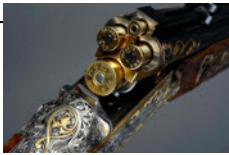

SSA Membership Fees for 2015

At the July Directors' meeting, the topic of our membership fee structure was discussed at length. Our membership fees have remained unchanged for the last 4 years. It was noted that our costs have increased over the last 4 years. We considered items like hydro, natural gas, gas for fuel, diesel etc.

Your directors decided that there would be a fee increase for 2015 of \$10.00 for Adult, Senior and Family memberships. The Junior, Student and Spouse fees would remain as is.

So to recap, in 2015, Renewal Fees would be Adult \$110.00, Senior Citizen \$95.00, Family \$135.00, Student \$40.00 and Junior \$35.00

Of course, this \$10.00 increase would also apply to new memberships. We would hope that this fee structure could remain for 4 years into the future.

We plan to have a renewal form included with the October newsletter.

Then you need to come to Sydenham Sportsmen Club.

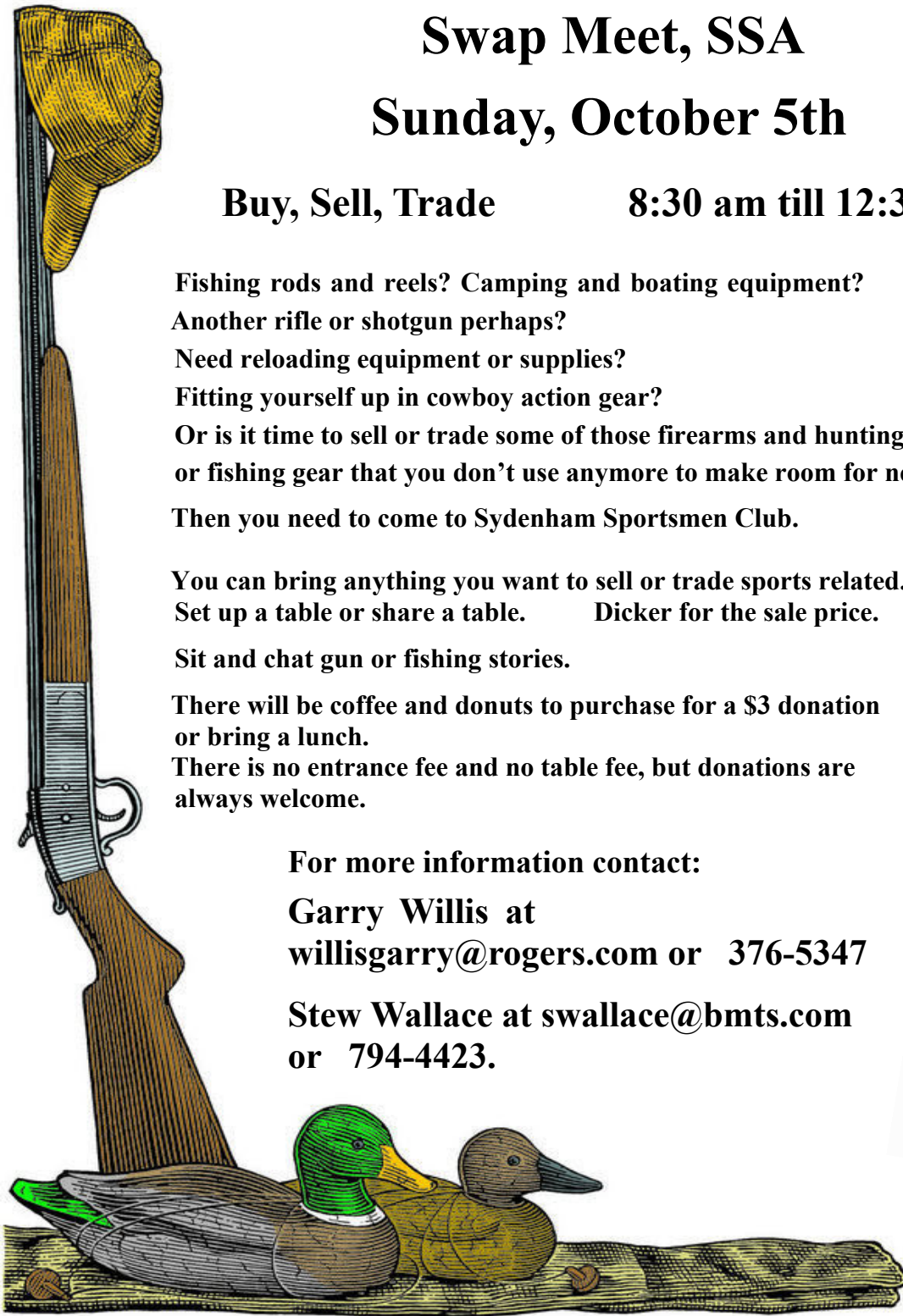
You can bring anything you want to sell or trade sports related.

OFAH Media Release

Community hatcheries stock more than 13 million fish in Ontario in 2013

OFAH & MNRF deliver record \$151,513 to 41 hatcheries through Community Hatchery Program

The Community Hatchery Program (CHP) is providing greater funding than ever before to community hatcheries raising public fish for public waters in Ontario. Some community hatcheries would find it challenging to remain operational without the support of a new funding partnership program between the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters (OFAH) and Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF).

The MNRF has committed \$250,000 annually for three years to allow the OFAH to administer CHP, which allocates funding and provides technical support to community based fish culture and/or fish stocking programs. CHP also assists community hatcheries to fulfill government requirements with respect to fish health, proper egg collection and the rearing and stocking of fish.

For most community hatchery volunteers, raising fish is their passion. More than 1,400 dedicated volunteers donated nearly 70,000 hours operating community hatcheries in 2013. Raising fish is not only time consuming, but the high costs of energy bills, fish feed and equipment can make hatcheries very expensive to operate. This year, CHP provided \$151,513 to 41 different community hatcheries in Ontario who stock about 13 million fish annually throughout the province. This is more than double the amount of funding that has been available to community hatcheries in the past.

"We have been very pleased to receive the much needed increase in funding from the Community Hatchery Program, which will allow us to continue operations and improve our stocking program," explained Kit Brown, volunteer with the Lake Erie Salmon and Trout Club.

Community hatcheries stock fish that contribute to rehabilitation of fish populations and create fishing opportunities for Ontario anglers. Many hatcheries double as a learning centre in their local communities by providing education on fish ecology and conservation for youth and the general public.

Community-based fish culture is built on a foundation of passion, dedication and genuine concern for resource management. Whether volunteers are raising Walleye, Lake Trout or Chinook Salmon, their commitment to raising and stocking fish can now be reinforced with greater funding and technical support through CHP. When you are out on the water this summer, think about the hard work and dedication of community hatchery volunteers who are helping to conserve local fisheries and create more fishing opportunities for Ontarians.

With more than 100,000 members, subscribers and supporters, and 720 member clubs, the OFAH is the province's largest nonprofit, fish and wildlife conservation-based organization and the VOICE of anglers and hunters. Water compels me.

There's nothing like the sensations accompanying a dive into the deeps of a fresh water lake, wading out from the ocean's shore into an unbroken horizon of blue or dunking off the dock's edge into the dark wind-broken water in the evening.

Getting in, getting wet is rarely a bad idea and there is growing evidence that spending time in nature is not only important but a necessary element of happiness and health.

I have made a lot of life decisions around proximity to water. The needle of my personal compass has always been pulled by liquid landscapes. From the banks of the St. Lawrence River in eastern Ontario where I grew up, to Haida Gwaii on the Pacific coast, to the river rich country of the Niagara Escarpment, the ability to get in, on or around water has been a leading determinant of where I live.

My six-year-old son spends hours searching for turtles and frogs along riverbanks. He spends hours climbing up onto an anchored raft only to launch back in —a swimmer's game of speed, distance and splash. It's timeless time spent.

For me, I feel deeply calm and content while swimming in vast Georgian Bay, wading into Lake Ontario across the limestone shelves of western Wolfe Island, or dipping into the Madawaska River's deep dark waters. I make time to put myself in these places because like a weight on an old-fashioned scale, these places, these moments balance the rest of them.

If you just walk in and around the big tent at the Owen Sound Salmon Spectacular you will readily understand the seemingly endless list of details that have to be done to make this derby a success. However many years we do this, as volunteers, there is always something that goes amiss. Case in point was this year's cover picture on the Sportsmen's Outdoor 2014 Annual Derby magazine that was credited to Bryan Nelson who I want to point out that although is not a member, like many others, comes out to help at the derby just because he cares about conservation.

The cover photograph was not Bryan's originally submitted picture but rather a photo shopped montage of his and some other people's pictures. 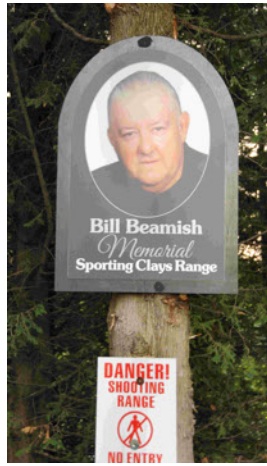
As the SSA President and one of the four derby committee chairpersons I want to formally apologize to Bryan for this mistake.
